Noongar

2014 has been another moorditj (great) year at Southwell. Kindergarten – Year 7 have been Noongar waangkan kaadadjiny (Noongar language learning) as part of our school's L.O.T.E program and kaadadjiny (learning) about Noongar culture. This year we have focused on 'Booyi Dordong' (Lifecycle of the Turtle), 'Kooboolong' (Frog), 'Kedala-k Kedalak-ngat' (Day and Night), 'Ngany' (Me), 'Moort' (Family) and 'Djerap' (Birds). Students have worked hard throughout the year to produce some very interesting and kwobidak (beautiful) work.

Throughout the year we have continued our learning about Aboriginal culture and traditions in classrooms and during Noongar sessions. We have discussed the Tindale Map, which is a map of Australia showing all the different Aboriginal Language groups throughout Australia. We have read and talked about the various Dreamtime Stories from different parts of Aboriginal Australia, as well as traditional Noongar stories. The senior classes have used these examples to write their own stories and have translated some of them into Noongar. The amount of interest and enthusiasm shown by all students was outstanding.

This year the National Aboriginal and Islander Day Observance Committee (N.A.I.D.O.C) celebrations were enjoyed by the whole school. We had the pleasure of listening to local traditional Noongar stories and the importance of Totems as part of the 'Totems Yarning' program from Mr Trevor Walley. Noongar Sports Association also came to the school and played various traditional Noongar games, which the children thoroughly enjoyed. These were followed by a delicious feed of kangaroo and damper, which is always a hit with both staff and students. Our N.A.I.D.O.C activities would not have been possible without funding we received from the City of Cockburn. We would like to thank the Council for their continued support of Cultural programs within our school.



2014 also saw all students place an entry into the Prime Minister's N.A.I.D.O.C Challenge. This national initiative encourages children to become involved in NA.I.D.O.C by producing a piece of artwork (junior) or a story/poem (senior) based on a theme. This year the senior category theme was Respect. Of the 32000 entrants from W.A, we were excited by the news that we had a winner in the junior category. Justine Turner in Yr4 received a N.A.I.D.O.C Medal for her fantastic artwork, which was presented to her at a special school assembly by representatives from the Cockburn Council including the Mayor, Logan Howlett. Justine was both honoured and shocked by her win. Her prize winning artwork is the backdrop for our pages. Moorditj effort Justine.

Huge Congratulations also to Yr. 7 student Shakayla Ugle for her selection into the U/13 State Schoolgirls Netball Team. Shakayla travelled to the Gold Coast for a week in September to compete in the National Netball Championships. Well done Shakayla.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank parents for their support throughout the year, in particular Candice Wynne and Laura Ugle. Your time and willingness to help out and lend a hand is appreciated by me and the school. We hope everybody has a fantastic and safe holiday. Children naturally love music! It's the wonder of feeling in both physically and emotionally. As the children have grown in their appreciation of the beauty of music and dance, they have acquired a gift that will bring them great pleasure in many ways.

Play the rapy

This year, some Southwell students were able to attend weekly Play therapy sessions. Through a range of activities these children are able to create and recreate scenes from the past that may in some instance be remembering happy accessions or may at times be revisiting unhappy incidents/moments. This recreation allows them to work through/resolve issues that may be bothering them. They could also be creating a story about a future event which they are anticipating either eagerly or with concern for which they want to feel prepared.

These sessions are all conducted with parental permission, in strictest confidence and by a trained and qualified Play Therapist. They provide an outlet for children experiencing anxiety, stress, social or emotional problems.

These Play Therapy sessions take place in the school's Outreach Centre so with the preparation of the sandwiches and fruit for each morning 'Fitness and Fuel' program and the sessions with the schools Chaplain. The Outreach Centre is a place of all positive associations.

Chaplain

The children and I have had a good year; we have talked and made craft. This year I have started to work with 2 groups of students – 1 group is a group of boys and we have been talking about resilience and how to be resilient, the other group is a group of girls and we have been talking about friendships - the importance of being polite. Both groups have done exceptionally well taking on board what they have learnt. They are all amazing and I know they will go on to do great things.

This year we had our biannual Dad and Daughter Dinner Dates, it was a great success. All the Dads and Daughters that attended had a lovely time, some of the Dads loved the idea so much that they are wanted to make it a regular event to take the daughters out for dinner.



Art

I have really enjoyed working with all classes this year. It is always inspiring to teach art to students who demonstrate a keen interest in developing their artistic skills using varied materials and methods. The biggest pleasure though, is seeing the wonderfully individual creative pieces the students produce. Sadly though, I was having as much fun as the children, and I forgot to take many photographs of them being creative

Earlier this year, our school was invited to exhibit work at the Cockburn Community art Festival. Many people commented on the superior quality and creative flair expressed in our students' work.

Get out in the fresh air and walk to school

This is our motto for the Travel-Smart to School team to convey to all students. The aim of Travel-Smart is to get as many students as possible out of cars and onto foot, scooters or pedals in order to get to school. Students are rewarded for their efforts with assorted prizes throughout the year including: Helmets, bike locks, water bottles, pencils, stickers, badges and notepads, and this is just to name a few. We held many events during the school year to promote Travel-Smart to school. The most enjoyable were the 'Walk to school breakfasts' we held for all students and their families. We got to walk to school, meet up with walking school buses and then got to have a beautiful breakfast once we arrived. Mmmm Delicious.

Horticultural officers

What an amazing group!

The four boys started Term one with ideas flowing, lots of energy and enthusiasm. They approached the project systematically area by area. Their brief was to create an area that physically challenges students whilst also giving them an area to be calm and creative. Our budget was almost nil so we had to draw a plan, which they did, and this was displayed in the library to consult with other students for more ideas. We consulted with Bunnings for more ideas, advice and donations. We had some limestone blocks left over from the car park wall and Tony Flanders helped us place them in a circle. When a tree fell in the storm, we asked the tree lopper if



he had any big logs we could have, the following week our big logs arrived. The boys placed tyres, like a combat field and filled them with mulch. Next we placed slabs down for a hop scotch. A path was made to go to the worm farm too. The big job of weeding and mulching was next. The team were tired and the whole school came in to support. The mulch pile is almost gone and the area looks transformed.

Damien our great gardener has assisted the team throughout the work and we are so grateful for his positive support of our school and this project.

The school reports to parents using the system reporting format, learning portfolios and three way interviews. Many students have individual education plans. This year trialled the Special Education Needs (SEN) component of reporting to parents

School Community Partnerships

In the school community partnership, the school and the family share responsibility for children's learning. Meetings with parents show relationship is based on mutual respect and acknowledgment of the assets and expertise of each member. More positive attitudes and behaviour are noticeable as parents show their willingness to support the school. The school has been a resource for families and community members, for example, by providing a point of contact to other agencies.

Buildings and Premises

A new stove has been installed in the pre-primary classroom, along with new Kitchen cupboards.

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All the buildings have new signs to help people find their way around the school. Blinds have been put up in some classroom. Interactive White boards are now in every classroom. Many of the old pinup boards have also been replaced in classrooms.

Survey results

The purpose of the school survey is to assist the school administration and school advisory committees evaluate our school and its programs. Our school is working to strengthen partnerships between our school and the community in order to help children perform better in school. To continue this effort, we need to collect information regarding the involvement of parents with the school. The purpose of this survey was to get opinions on how well the school met the needs of students and how people feel about the school's activities.

84.8% of families indicated 'My child likes being at this school.'


